A new chapter for Poland: female deputies and a senator to sit in the parliament for the first time

calls me Martynka, because I look young. The roles of young girls don't hinder my development, but give me a second life," explains the actress in her interview with Anna Konieczyńska. Mary Komasa has been active in the music industry for more than 10 years, but she is not into continuous efforts to be recognized. For this singer, performer, Chanel muse and activist, creative development is still most important. "I want to show people my world in this darkness, isolated from other stimuli. Clothing is a part of this story," says the artist in her interview with Karolina Sulej. Kamila Wagner, our fashion journalist, visits the Paris apartment of Florence Cools. This Belgian woman is the owner of the La Collection brand, which she runs with Artur Tadevosian, her husband and business partner.

"Women Dressing Women" exhibition: constant need to support the feminist narrative in the fashion context

The exhibition titled "Women Dressing Women" can be visited in the New York's Costume Institute as of 7 December 2023. It is an homage to women forgotten in the history of fashion. One of them was Ann Lowe, the designer of the wedding dress of Jackie Kennedy, which made her incur a debt of over two thousand dollars. She would often not receive satisfactory remuneration for her work because of the color of her skin. The world of fashion has also forgotten about Elizabeth Keckley, who designed and sewed for the Lincolns and purchased her freedom only when she was 37 years old. The New York's exhibition not only reaches to the past, but is also intended to promote contemporary designers. "Despite the lack of common aesthetic traits or any clear biographical similarities, those female creators share the common theme of disarming the male domination and rejecting the social oppression of women and their bodies," analyzes Kamila Wagner.

Carolyn Bessette-Kennedy: the most famous minimalist of the 1990s

Her capsule wardrobe is a dream of many women. She is an icon of minimalist looks of the 1990s. Carolyn Bessette-Kennedy is still a model of natural style based on quality, as opposed to quantity. She knew all about it, since she worked in the fashion industry. However, she had loved simple forms and classic designs even before she met her future husband, John F. Kennedy Jr., a son of the 35th President of the United States and Jacqueline Kennedy-Onassis. She worked for Calvin Klein, not only as a spokesperson, but also as a muse of the designer, who would often test the newest prototypes of his designs. "She used fashion to interact with or to handle the world around her," writes Sunita Kumar Nair about Carolyn's style in her book titled "CBK: Carolyn Bessette Kennedy: A Life in Fashion".
